



## Innovative programs honoured for making communities safer

Tuesday, 9 November 2010

Seven projects have been recognised at an awards ceremony recently for their individual and collaborative initiatives aimed at making South Australian communities safer and more resilient.

Now in its 11<sup>th</sup> year, the 2010 Australian Safer Communities Awards, sponsored by the Commonwealth Attorney General's Department, were presented by the Minister for Emergency Services, Michael Wright and SA Fire and Emergency Services Commission (SAFECOM) Chief Executive, David Place and at the Adelaide Oval Function Centre on Thursday 4 November.

Minister for Emergency Services, Michael Wright congratulated the winners and commended the organisations for providing their staff the opportunity to contribute their time and skills to projects that reduce the threat and consequence of emergencies in our communities.

"The projects all demonstrate a commitment to the fundamental shift in focus of emergency management beyond disaster response and toward prevention and preparedness and resilience. They illustrate that everyone can do something to prevent or reduce the consequence of emergency hazards", Minister Wright said.

Mr Place thanked the successful nominees and urged all of the entrants to continue making South Australia a safer place to live.

"There were a number of exceptional projects entered this year and deciding the winners was a challenging task. A significant feature of many projects was the collaboration that occurred across public and private sector organisations, enhancing the community benefit beyond what can be achieved independently be each organisation. It is a privilege to support these awards and I wish our three State Winners every success at the forthcoming National Awards," Mr Place said.

The first State Winner Award was presented to the SA State Emergency Service (SES), SA Health, Department for Families and Communities and the Bureau of Meteorology for their collaborative Extreme Heat Response. The project provides well researched, strategically consistent and complementary services to effectively deploy their collective resources.

A joint project between SANTOS and SA Police also received a State Winner Award for a trilogy of exercises based at Moomba and conducted over an 18 month period. The exercises tested response to a suspected terrorist incident, in a remote location in extreme weather conditions. More than 200 people from a large and diverse group of public and private sector organisations were brought together to determine best practice and identify opportunities for innovation and effective interaction.

The final State Winner Award was for the Patient Delay Project, in recognition of the outstanding personal commitment made by Intensive Care Paramedic, Mr Steven Holmes. Mr Holmes developed and has personally presented interactive information sessions to more than 6400 participants, outlining how to recognise heart attack symptoms and reinforcing the need to dial 000 to seek assistance. This project clearly illustrated the difference that can be made through the vision, drive and determination of a single individual, providing effective and broad reaching community education.

The State Winner entries will now be considered for the 2010 National Safer Community Awards. National Winners will be announced in Canberra on 29 November 2010.
